

Summer 2017 Projects! by Angela Spooner/ Wayne White

Work on two of the Tsolum River 'Top 3' priority projects will be staring in August 2017. The Dove Creek bedload trap is being funded by the Habitat Conservation Fund Trust and financial contributions from our Society. The survey and project design report have been completed and work permit is pending. Lower Dove Creek high quality rearing habitat was recovering over the last decade, but new slope failures and bedload influx in the upper portions of Dove Creek are threatening to infill the lower reaches of Dove Creek. Removing this excess bedload is critical to the ongoing recovery of the lower reaches of Dove Creek and the Tsolum River where much of the higher quality habitat is found.

We were successful in obtaining funding from RFCCP (DFO Rec Fish) for gravel bar planting in the mid-elevation of the Tsolum scheduled for 2017/2018. We are very excited to start the field work in August of assessing all the gravel bars. This assessment will allow us to plan the 2018 gravel bar planting at the upper end of the project area; as well as for all the gravel bars in the longer term project vision.

Summary of School Outreach Season by Caroline Heim

After the fall field trip season, we focused on our 3D watershed model tours. The fibreglass model proved its worth and withstood many applications of water. The model toured with Caroline Heim, Laura Ann O'Brien and Val Sherriff to Huband, Queneesh, Courtenay, Puntledge, Cumberland, Lake Trail, Isfeld and Arden schools. Over 1,650 students learned about the Comox Valley Watershed and the story of the historical copper mine up at Mount Washington that polluted the Tsolum River for many years.

For most of the school kids, the capping of the mine site happened around when they were born; knowing the past history and the efforts by local citizens to fix environmental problems is an important and positive local history and environmental lesson for the kids that reinforces the message that action can lead to change. The interactive hands on watershed model incorporates learning about point source pollution inputs, and how different land uses can change the watershed hydrology, or how water moves through our watershed.

Look for our watershed model in action, as well as our salmon wheel and display at a variety of summer events including Musicfest on the weekend of July 14, 15 and 16th, and at the Comox Valley Exhibition on August 25, 26th and 27th.

We are currently designing a school program for the 2017/18 school year that will complement the watershed model program. We will build on the knowledge that the kids gained, and will focus on biodiversity, macroinvertebrate collecting and identification, and riparian habitats.

Trees, trees and more trees...by Dave Morwood

We have the best selection of trees we have ever had thanks to our patrons TimberWest and Fanny Bay Enhancement Society. In our inventory we have 230 Douglas Fir, 230 Red Cedar, 130 Grand Fir, 75 Hemlock, and 50 Sitka Spruce. We also have a limited supply of cones and cages to protect the young seedlings. Most of our trees come as seedlings that we use immediately for our restoration work, or put into pots for future use.

We have given out 150 trees this year so far for riparian planting largely in the Tsolum system but also on the Puntledge River and Comox Lake. Recently we planted 20 cedar trees with help from a local Scouts troop around a memorial bench for Stewart Duncan at Tsolum Spirit Park. Trees have also gone to K'ómoks First Nations for gravel bar planting on the lower Tsolum and to a number of landowners along the river.

We expect most of our present supply to be used for riparian and gravel bar planting this summer and fall; there are also trees available for landowners on the river however we suggest that they wait until the rains come in Sept/Oct. before planting.

An important component of Tsolum watershed restoration is on-going efforts to plant coniferous trees along riparian areas.



If you are a landowner, live near the riparian areas of the Tsolum River, or tributaries such as Dove, Portuguese, or Finlay Creeks, we can supply you with potted trees and/or people to plant trees for you. We can advise about tree care after planting and can call upon the expertise of a certified arborist in our organization as necessary.


As mentioned, the **Dove Creek bedload** trap will be excavated below the Duncan Bay Mainstem this August. After removal of up to 2500 cubic meters of material, the trap edge and outflow will be bio-engineered to enhance rearing habitat using blast rock, locally found boulders and large woody debris. On-going monitoring and regular emptying of the bedload trap will follow. The gravel trap enhances fish habitat as it also provides a low flow rearing habitat for fish as water levels drop in the summer.

With the funding from DFO Rec Fish for live stake gravel bar planting in the mid-elevation of the Tsolum, the plan is for a multiyear project with 2018 planting being the first in a series of gravel bar plantings starting upstream and working downstream



towards the Inland Island Highway. With methodology set and lessons learned in the first two years, we will be applying for further funding to complete this large scale project past 2018.

We are continuing to work with the K'ómoks First Nation to secure funding for the lower Tsolum gravel bar removal project. The project planning is nearing completion and we have scaled it back excluding the diking on the adjacent sod farm. The uncertainties in predicting a design flood level with the rapidly changing conditions in the Tsolum make it too risky to do the diking. The project will be focused on the protection of KFN land which contains archaeological sites of interest to the Nation and they are hoping to secure 2018 project funding.

Remembering Stewart Duncan by Laura Ann O'Brien

One of our founding directors, Stewart Duncan, who was profiled in our 2017 Winter newsletter, lost his battle with cancer and passed away on February 25, 2017. We are forever grateful for Stewart's dedication and commitment to cleaning up the mine site pollution that plagued the Tsolum River for decades.

A Gratitude Gathering was held on June 10 to remember Stewart. Here is an excerpt from my speech on behalf of the TRRS that illustrates Stewart's commitment to the Tsolum: "Stewart embraced and embodied the Tsolum spirit. He drank the water, walked on the banks, explored the forests, photographed the natural beauty, learned more about the lack of fish, hosted an experimental coho project on Anne and his land, attended innumerable meetings and field trips of all kinds with government and industry partners, demanded action, guided the Society as president, built bridges - both literally and figuratively - with partners and the community, removed fish barriers, donated artwork and equipment, was a regular financial donor and most importantly contributed his time, which is the most valuable donation anyone can give."

To read more about Stewart please see the entire speech on our website along with short videos made by some of us. We commissioned a bench to honour Stewart and it was installed at Tsolum Spirit Park on June 11, 2017 with family and friends being led by Scottish piper through the forest to the river. One of our other directors, Stewart "Stewy" McIntosh carved a beautiful pair of spawning pink salmon that adorn the top plank of the bench to add a personal touch. It is a fitting tribute to a man who gave so much to the River without asking for anything in return, and a place for us to go to quietly remember his legacy and enjoy the river he loved so much.





TRRS would like to thank Anne Davies and all the generous caring people who made donations to us on behalf of Stewart Duncan. In total, \$4,000.00 was donated; this money will directly fund our on-going restoration projects, and education outreach programs.
